Sports

Inadequate investment in grassroots sports, inadequate sponsorship for athletes and sports activities, poor fitness routines and eating habits of athletes, lack of sports amenities including top notch training facilities, equipment and coaches for athletes to improve skills, unhealthy and poor human-relationships borne as a result of overemphasis on winning at all cost, widening engagement gap between inter-school sports authorities and national/sub-national sports bodies, inadequate platforms to bridge gap between sports and formal and informal education

Health

Chronic shortage of health equipment and medicines, drugs and vaccines, lack of logistics for health outreach activities, challenges with access to quality and affordable health care, inadequate cadre of specialised and skilled human resource for health, inadequate investment in preventive health, community apathy towards communicable and non-communicable diseases, inadequate community knowledge of health rights, low awareness of health system issues, inadequate platforms for citizen-provider-decisionmakers partnerships, inadequate private sector engagement in health, lack of transparency and accountability in health service delivery

Arts and Culture

Limited space for promotion of local arts and culture, low political commitment, lack of investment and financing for sector, promotion of western and regional arts and cultures to the detriment of Ghanaian arts and culture, inadequate opportunities to develop skills and talents, inadequate representation from artists of marginalized identities/backgrounds, lack of mentors, inadequate markets for promotion of Ghanaian products, community perceptions, inadequate private sector participation, sexual abuse and exploitation by leading artisans, artistes and influencers with wealth and strong political and social networks, inadequate platforms for exhibiting of Ghanaian products, inadequate systems to link in-school arts with national agencies and institutions responsible for talent harnessing, expensive media landscape

Education

High cost of education, lack of teaching aids and materials, untrained and unqualified teachers, overcrowding in schools and lecture halls, geographical access and quality issues, lack of structures and resources to support vulnerable and disadvantaged persons such as persons with disabilities and those with special needs, inadequate or poor water and sanitation facilities, gender stereotyping, inadequate platforms and opportunities for students, parents and guardians to engage with duty bearers and key decision makers, inadequate transparency and accountability mechanisms

Youth Empowerment and Entrepreneurship

Lack of employment opportunities, inadequate supporting mechanisms for innovations and new businesses by young people, limited opportunities in technological development by young people inadequate support and funding mechanisms for informal sectors including vocational training and skill learning centres, inadequate education on sex and alcohol, drug, substance use, limited access to sexual and reproductive health services, inadequate capacity building and social protection platforms to engage youth, peer pressures and materialism and social media pressures
